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SURVEY ON CLOSED TEMPLES IN ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT

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Introduction

In Sri Lanka, Buddhism is considered the major core of the culture. The Buddhist temple is the main cultural place in this Sri Lankan society based on Agriculture. Closing of Buddhist temple is a nightmare of Sri Lankan society. In present Buddhism in Sri Lanka is facing two main problems. One is disrobing of Bhiksus and other is closing of temples.

In this survey project, it is expected to gather data about closed Buddhist temples in past ten years (From 2004) & statistically interpret collected data. In addition to that, researchers have planned to produce suitable remedies for overcome this problem.

At the first level researchers prepared a form (fig.1) to collect data from relevant "Grama Niladari" division of each AGA divisions. After preparing these forms were distributed among all 22 AGA offices. Researchers mainly distributed forms via Buddhist affair officer of AGA office.

Discussion:

There are several deviations collected data of researchers & provided details of district secretariat of Anuradhapura. It is found that possible reasons for these deviations are;

- District secretariat of Anuradhapura has not collected data in very basic level like "Grama Niladari" divisions
- 2. Some closed temples are now reopened.
- 3. Some Buddhist monks do not provide true data of closed temples that they aware.

Therefore it is very clear that there are many closed temples in Anuradhapura district especially in rural areas. It is no doubt that there are much more closed and abounded temples in all over Sri Lanka. Therefore researchers suggest following remedies for this problem.

- Accommodate Buddhist monks for closed temples via Ministry of Buddha Sasana.
- 2. Establish a special institute and a fund to provide facilities for closed temples under Ministry of Buddha Sasana.
- Provide special allowance and food essentials for a certain period of time to newly accommodate Buddhist monks.
